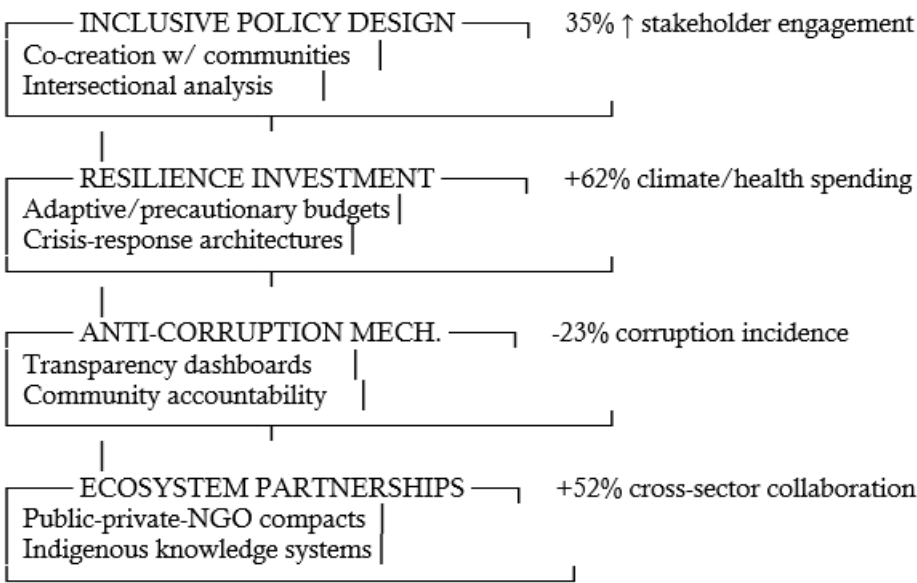
- Mediation Analysis (Sobel Test):
